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Project Background

- FEMA is modernizing Flood Insurance Rate Maps in Palm Beach County.
- FEMA Procedure Memorandum 34 dated August 22, 2005 requires levees used for flood protection to be certified by the levee owner.
- SFWMD hired AMEC Environment & Infrastructure, Inc. to certify the levee system as an Accredited Levee for flood protection.

- L-40 Levee
- Constructed in December 1952 by USACE
 - **Total Length: 20.5 miles**
- L-85 Levee
- Constructed in June 2004 by USACE
 - **Total Length: 9.1 miles**
- <u>Ownership transferred to</u> <u>SFWMD</u>

L-40 Levee Regrading Purpose and Objective

- Comply with requirements for levee certification set forth by FEMA
- Provide 1-foot freeboard under the 100-year flood event
- Overcome long term settlement of the levee

Length of Work = 9.5 Miles Volume of Material = 62,810 tons Duration = March 2015 – November 2015



Levee Study and Analysis \$1,202,620 G-94 Project \$5,302,849 L-40 Levee Regrading **Engineering Estimate – by Contractor** \$2,197,000 Actual Cost – by the Field Station \$1,378,547 sfwmd.gov

Certification to FEMA

- Levee Certification December 2015
- Without Certification:
 - FEMA remaps areas landward of levee as High Risk, Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA).
 - High Risk, SFHA requires purchase of additional flood insurance.
 - Due to the high density of buildings adjacent to the levee, thousands of building owners would be affected.
