

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Letter from the Division Director



Summer Programming 2022 is in the books! As I promised last year, we reached out to parents, providers and the youth to make sure that we were simultaneously bridging the gaps and ensuring quality programming during the summer months. Last year, parents and children asked for more educational and fun activities in their community. They wanted us to know that the impact of COVID-19 on emotional and educational achievement was real, and that the demands placed on our children has increased their need for mental health support.

This year we focused on providing enriching experiences for the summer to enhance growth, increase supports, improve learning and practice safe behaviors. Through the summer camp scholarship program, more than 3600 children had an opportunity to attend camps that fostered their growth through sports, dance, music, art, technology, mentoring, academics and play. All camps had access to free mental health services through the Youth Services Departments' youth and family counseling therapists for both campers and their families. Our children continue to demonstrate resilience and a thirst for knowledge.

As I look towards the future, the smiles on the faces of the children who had an opportunity to dance at the Jamathon, spell out loud for the judges at the Bee or read in their quiet corner of their camp, sits with me. I have heard their requests for more. More reading! More sports! More music! More dance! More arts and crafts! More opportunities!

To our camp providers, as your heart, head, and hands nurture our children, I challenge you to bring them more...

To my OCP team, who works tirelessly, thinking outside the box, I challenge you to raise the bar, and bring them more...

To the parents, I challenge you to allow them access so that we can bring them more...

To the Board of County Commissioners, County Administration, Children's Services Council, I thank you for recognizing the importance of our children's growth and for working with us as we bring them more...

I am excited about the prospect of what everyone will bring to the table for summer 2023.

Purpose:

The Summer Camp Scholarship Program (SCSP) provides full-tuition and fees for summer camp for children residing in families with income at or below 150% of Federal Poverty Guidelines or who meet priority criteria (foster care, homeless, or involvement with the delinquency systems).

Funding for the SCSP is provided through a partnership between the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners and the Children's Services Council. Friends of Youth Services and Palm Beach County, Inc. serves as the fiscal agent responsible for managing funds and retaining financial records.

Program Summary:

SCSP pays full-tuition for eligible children to attend day camp during the summer months. Camps across Palm Beach County are encouraged to apply to be a Summer Camp Scholarship site and offer educational, recreational, and other programming to meet the needs of Palm Beach County children.

Database Application:

With the implementation of the SCSP electronic application in 2018, the number of applications for scholarships has increased. Through technology, the application is accessible from any computer or mobile device. Parents also have the option to come into the Palm Beach County Youth Services Department's main office to complete their application and receive assistance from SCSP staff, or attend scheduled outreach opportunities within the community. The easy online access provided by the database application has proven to be successful as measured by the increased number of applications and the decrease in outreach attendance.






Camp Reimbursement:

- Camp must be offered 5 days per week (exceptions: county-observed holiday or natural disaster)
- Campers must attend a minimum of 12 hours per week to qualify for reimbursement
- Regular & Specialty Camps = \$130 per camper per week
- EEC Camps = \$150 per camper per week
- Special Needs Camps = \$350 per camper per week



2015 - 2022 Special Populations Trend:




Numbers are based on the scholarships utilized by campers (rather than the number awarded).

The homeless youth may also attribute its utilization decrease to the virtual learning platform shift at the end of the 2019-2020 school year which may have led to underreporting of homeless youth. As school are returning to in-person learning, the number is starting to rise.





Educational Enrichment Camps:

Annually, the EEC providers submit a report with a summary of their summer camp experience including accomplishments, challenges, curriculum information, successes, and suggestions for next summer.

Accomplishments:




School District of Palm Beach County's L.I.T. Summer Curriculum

The L.I.T. (Liberating Inspirational Transformative) Summer Curriculum was created by the School District of Palm Beach County's (SDPBC) Teaching and Learning Division Office of African, African American, Latino, Holocaust, and Gender Studies.

This free program was developed for SCSP camps in 2021 to include culturally relevant activities for participants in grades 6 – 8.

In 2022, the SDPBC expanded the program to include a 9-week curriculum for primary grades K – 5.

The goal of the program is to engage and inspire students through movement, art, music, and real-world experiences. All camps were offered training and encouraged to participate in this program.



Scholastic Literacy Project

In 2021, funding provided by Friends of Youth Services launched the Scholastic's LitCamp literacy program. This pilot provided 17 camps a curriculum for teachers/counselors and a library of over 250 books that camps can keep and reuse. The "bunks" provide one-hour of daily summer reading curriculum and books by campers grade level.

One challenge identified through provider feedback was the difficulty administering the curriculum with camps that house multiple grade levels together.

In 2022 after the completion of the pilot, YSD used the remaining books and separated them into categories that followed the Scholastic seven strengths series. A curriculum around this series as well as the book *Bud*, *Not Buddy* for middle school-aged campers. Four camps were selected to pilot these new curriculums.


Children's Services Council Filming
