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YSD Doctoral Internship Program Receives APA Accreditation

The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department's (YSD) Residential Treatment & Family Counseling Division's Doctoral Internship Program received full accreditation from the American Psychological Association for seven years, the maximum period granted.

"We have always known that our internship program is remarkable, and now we have even more validation," said Dr. Shayna Ginsburg, Youth Services Education and Training Center Chief of Clinical Services. "This exciting news will serve as motivation to continue to enhance our training program."

YSD's <u>Education and Training Center</u> is a community resource for primary prevention through education, training and professional development. It provides free services to parents, children, families, school personnel and mental health professionals in Palm Beach County. The center is responsible for developing and implementing trainings, workshops and community outreach activities. It also serves as a student/trainee placement site for doctoral interns, postdoctoral residents and doctoral/master's level practicum students.

The <u>Highridge Family Center</u> celebrated its 20th anniversary with a carnival celebration on April 1. The event also unveiled the center's new trauma-informed services based on the Sanctuary Model.

The Highridge Family Center offers a three-to-four-month, weekday residential treatment program for Palm Beach County youth, ages 11-16, who are experiencing problems at home, school, with friends and in the community. YSD partners with the School District of Palm Beach County to provide school instruction on campus in a small classroom setting.

The Sanctuary Model is an evidence-supported model for clinical and organizational change. At its core, the model promotes safety and recovery from adversity through the active creation of a trauma-informed community and a focus on resiliency in spite of adverse childhood events (ACEs).

"We recognize that trauma can have long-lasting effects well into adulthood," Tammy Fields, Palm Beach County Youth Services Department director said. "Our goal is to build resilience in the children we serve by providing a supportive system of care."

Event attendees toured the Highridge Family Center, learned about the center's services and community resources, and enjoyed games and refreshments. Among those in attendance were Mayor Paulette Burdick, County Administrator Verdenia Baker, and Assistant County Administrators Todd Bonlarron and Nancy Bolton.

YSD Implements Weekend Fill-The-Gap Feeding Initiative



The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department partnered with South Florida Hunger Coalition, Inc., and Living Hungry, Inc., to implement the Weekend Fill-The-Gap Feeding Program at the County-funded Youth Empowerment Centers (YECs) located in Belle Glade, Lake Worth and Riviera Beach.

The program provides 100 youth with take-home packages of quality nutrition during weekends when summer meals may not be available. The program's goal is to prevent our YEC youth from going hungry over the weekend.

The Weekend Fill-The-Gap Feeding Program is based on menus in biweekly rotation. A sample package may include the following items:

- 8 fresh fruits
- 4 fresh vegetables and canned green beans
- 4 servings of cereal
- 4 servings of 2% shelf-stable milk
- 8 Nutrigrain bars
- 2 family meals (uncooked rice and lentils, a macaroni and cheese box)
- 3 canned meals (pasta, tuna and chicken)

YSD Participates in "Ties That Bind" Initiative

YSD Senior Program Specialist and Palm Beach County My Brother's Keeper Task Force Leader Ike Powell participated in the City of West Palm Beach "Ties That Bind" initiative on May 20, at Shiloh Family Worship Center. The initiative brought together community and civic leaders and was hosted by West Palm Beach City Commissioner Cory Neering, in partnership with local leaders.

Attendees included Palm Beach County Commissioner Mack Bernard, State Senator Bobby Powell, State Representative Al Jacquet and West Palm Beach Commissioner Shanon Materio.

This proactive initiative provided the 40 young men in attendance, ages 14-19, a day filled with mentorship and conversations on civic engagement, decision making, law enforcement interactions, and male responsibility. Attendees shared their stories and recommendations for personal development.



The day culminated with leaders providing each of the young men with neckties and one-on-one instructions on how to tie a necktie. Additionally, event participants established mentor relationships and opportunities for further collaboration.

Future Leaders United for Change: Sowing the Seeds of Community

The youth-led group <u>Future Leaders United for Change</u> (Future Leaders) held a workshop-style council meeting on Tuesday, May 30. The meeting was hosted by Debra Tendrich, founder and CEO of Eat Better Live Better, accompanied by Eric Gordon, Rotary International District 6930 District Governor 2016-2017.

During the meeting, the Future Leaders learned about healthy eating habits and tips to enable a seamless transition into a healthy lifestyle. Poor diets lead to obesity, low self-esteem, poor school attendance, bullying, anxiety, depression, and an abundance of other medical and psychological conditions. The Future Leaders also discussed the connection between a healthy lifestyle and the issues that plague the community. In addition, a decision to provide healthier eating options at upcoming meetings was reviewed.

The team also discussed their future project One Seed One Plant, One County, an outreach effort between Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures, Future Leaders United for Change, Palm Beach County governments and community partners. This project's purpose is to alleviate hunger, foster good health and wellness, and create economic access throughout the County. Future Leaders will plant a



community garden, and the first fruit tree will be planted at a designated plot at CareerSource Palm Beach County. The site will also serve as a memorial for the late Michelle Dryer, former Director of Community Partnerships at Career Source Palm Beach County.

Future Leaders is a cadre of Palm Beach County youth, ages 11 to 22. Its mission is to be the voice of youth in Palm Beach County and create leaders through self-motivation, determination and education. The group's purpose is to raise awareness of youth concerns and help develop solutions to address identified issues.

Show of Appreciation for YSD's Summer Camp Scholarship Program

YSD's <u>Summer Camp Scholarship Program</u> has awarded 2,934 scholarships and approved 110 camps. The number of educational camps focusing on school readiness has increased from 14 sites in 2016 to 22 sites this summer. These educational camps help children retain and keep their reading, math and other academic skills sharp during the summer.

The program has also added one special needs camp, one sports camp in Riviera Beach, and two educational sites in

Belle Glade (separate from the Pahokee and Canal Point sites).

The Summer Camp Scholarship Program provides full-tuition and fees for summer camp for children residing in families with income at or below 150% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. It allows parents to work with the knowledge that their children are safe. It gives children educational and recreational opportunities for growth. Parents may choose from participating camps in Palm Beach County.

YSD's <u>Summer Food Service Program</u> (SFSP) has acquired 18 new sites. Currently, the program has 73 open sites in Palm Beach County, from Boca Raton to Jupiter, out to the Glades. Since 2013, SFSP has served 1,144,644 meals. In 2016 alone, SFSP served 231,099 meals.

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) provides healthy, free meals and snacks available to youth in Palm Beach County during the summer months. The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), administered and monitored by the Youth Services Department and funded by the USDA, provides free, nutritious meals and snacks to help children in low-income areas. This helps ensure children receive the nutrition they need to learn, play and grow, throughout the summer months when they are out of school.

11. Bonus Question: Is there something about you that your fellow coworkers would be surprised to know?


Few people know that my favorite flower is the beautiful, aromatic lilac. Unfortunately, lilac bushes do not grow here in south Florida.


