BIRTH TO 22 HOSTS ANNUAL TASK FORCE MEETING





The Seventh Annual Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures Task Force meeting was held at the Clayton E. Hutcheson Agricultural Center on January 16, 2024. After being held virtually for several years, this in-person event hosted over 100 participants, including parents, family members,

school representatives, students, community members, and agency representatives. The meeting was split into two sessions: a review of the previous year and an interactive discussion about the Youth Master Plan 2.0 draft.

As Birth to 22 enters its 10th year as a collective impact, Tammy K. Fields, Palm Beach County Assistant County Administrator, and Lisa Williams-Taylor, CEO of the Children's Services Council (CSC) of Palm Beach County, highlighted the 2023 accomplishments as well as the major milestones achieved over the last 10 years. The task force meeting was also a transitional moment as Tammy accepted a promotional opportunity within the county. She was thanked for her contributions and passion towards Birth to 22 and introduced the new Birth to 22 Steering Committee Co-Chair, Elisa Cramer, who is Interim Director of the Youth Services Department (YSD).

The task force meeting showcased two youth-led workgroups, Future Leaders: United for Change and the Girls Voice Task Force, which have hosted community service projects, engaged youth in skill-building and leadership initiatives, and planned events throughout 2024.

The Youth Master Plan (YMP) serves as the blueprint for setting priorities and taking action to improve the lives of

children and youth in Palm Beach County. Before the Task Force meeting, the registered participants were provided a draft of the "YMP 2.0," an update of the plan based on community input and data. During the second session of the Task Force meeting, Jeannette Gordon, an independent consultant, facilitated discussions to gather feedback on the draft, including the strengths, gaps, and overall comprehensiveness of the proposed plan.

The new YMP focuses on youth transitioning to adulthood with strategic priority areas of mental health, economic access, and education while highlighting safety. Once finalized, this plan will guide the next three years of services and funding opportunities for the Birth to 22 Alliance.

YOUTH SERVICES HOSTS CHILDREN'S HOME **ASSOCIATION OF ILLINOIS (CHAIL)**



On October 25 and 26, 2023, the Youth Services Department (YSD) hosted an executive team of four from the Children's Home Association of Illinois (CHAIL) for a Sanctuary Implementation Overview visit. The Sanctuary

Institute named the Palm Beach County Youth Services Department a model agency for implementing the model across clinical and non-clinical domains within an organization. The purpose of the 2-day visit focused on hearing from all levels of YSD staff about implementation challenges and successes. The visit ended with the team observing a youth graduating from the Highridge Family Center residential therapeutic program, where they were able to see the Sanctuary Model in action.

The CHAIL team plans to implement the Sanctuary Model and was very thankful for YSD's time and dedication to providing a comprehensive overview by demonstrating the commitment to Open Communication, Democracy, Social Learning, and Growth and Change.

IKE POWELL REPRESENTS YSD AT NATIONAL MENTORING SUMMIT

In January 2024, Ike Powell, Director of Outreach & Community Programming at Palm Beach County Youth Services Department, attended the National Mentor Summit in Washington, DC. The conference offered opportunities to participate in workshops about evidence-based programs, experience inspirational keynote speakers, and share about the great strides made in Palm Beach County. Mr. Powell also had a chance to meet with national leaders.





PBC PROCLAIMS JANUARY NATIONAL MENTORING MONTH

At the Board of County Commissioners meeting on January 23, 2024, Commissioner Mack Bernard presented a proclamation declaring January 2024 as Mentoring Month in Palm Beach County. This annual campaign helps to raise awareness and celebrate the powerful impact of mentoring relationships, recruit new mentors and encourage institutions to integrate quality mentoring into their policies and practices. Mentoring programs significantly impact youth academic achievement, school connectedness and engagement, and educational success, which can lead to positive outcomes such as improved attendance, grades, test scores, and classroom behavior.



YSD HOSTS COMMUNITY BASED AGENCIES 2024 KICKOFF AND QUARTER 2 MEETING

The Youth Services Department hosted its Community Based Agencies (CBAs) FY2024 Kickoff meeting on October 17, 2023, at 9:00 a.m. at the Clayton E. Hutcheson Agricultural Services Center.

After engaging in a Sanctuary Community Meeting, JaVona Wilson, Program Coordinator of YSD's Outreach and Community Programming Division (OCP) got the group up and moving with a bingo icebreaker. The agency staff learned more about each other and other agencies while earning prizes. Valerie Messineo, Senior Program Specialist of OCP, presented agency programmatic requirements and dates to remember, and polled the group for feedback to improve the annual report/logic model processes.

Ty Hall, Financial Analyst II, of the Finance, Contracting, and Administrative Services Division, reviewed the Services and Activities Management Information System (SAMIS), including frequently asked questions and common invoice errors.

Wen Fils-Aime, Program Coordinator, and Tamia Williams, Senior Program Specialist of OCP, presented on the Summer Camp Scholarship Program. They encouraged the agencies to get involved by applying to be a summer camp, assisting their families with applications, and spreading the word about the program. Each CBA contract encourages agencies to get involved with the Birth to 22 United for Brighter Futures Alliance.

The group was provided an update about how they could get involved and the areas of support needed, and then JaVona told the group about the work of Future Leaders.



Youth Service's Outreach and Community Programming Division (OCP) hosted its FY2024 second quarterly Community Based Agencies (CBA) meeting on January 9, 2024, at 9:00 am at the Clayton E. Hutcheson Agricultural Services Center. This meeting introduced multiple free resources to the agency staff. Johnathan Brown, Director of PBC Housing and Economic Development Department, shared funding resources for the development of affordable housing.

Victoire Begeansma of Jewish Family Services (JFS) discussed the benefits of Youth Mental Health First Aid training. JFS will go directly to an agency's location to provide this free training if requested. Samantha Corr of PBC Environmental Resources Management introduced the Trailblazers program for youth 11 years and older. It allows them to get outdoors, out of their comfort zone, and to try new things.

Valerie Messineo, Senior Program Specialist of OCP presented on agency programmatic requirements, dates to remember, and provided technical support focused on monthly reports. Wen Fils-Aime, Program Coordinator, and Tamia Williams, Senior Program Specialist of OCP, discussed the Summer Camp Scholarship Program and the process to submit an application, and upcoming workshops. To provide opportunities for CBAs to get involved with Birth to 22, JaVona Wilson of OCP, shared information about Future Leaders and the Girls Voice Task Force. The two workgroups are teaming up to create a hub that will meet bi-monthly at the Youth Services Department. There is a continuing need for agencies to partner with the program to ensure there are youth participants.

At the CBA kick-off meeting in October, agencies stated they wanted more support around trauma and how to support youth who share challenging personal information with staff. The Center for Child Counseling provided a free, 90-minute training after the quarterly meeting on PACE (Positive/Adverse Childhood Experiences) and incorporating activities to respond to students meaningfully and helpfully.

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2023 GIRLS COORDINATING COUNCIL 5K

On Saturday, October 7, 2023, Youth Services represented in helping to execute the Girls Coordinating Council (GCC) of Palm Beach County's 2nd Annual 5K Run/Walk. The Girls Coordinating Council is a community collaborative focusing on reforming and strengthening the system of care for girls and increasing the availability of gender-responsive, traumainformed, and strength-based services for girls.



HIGHRIDGE FAMILY CENTER HONORS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In February 2024, Highridge Family Center honored Black History Month at the youth residential therapeutic center by transforming the cafeteria into a "Black History Museum," which had the following under display:


- Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) Wall, a current events wall, an "Inventors and their Inventions" Table, a Young Heroes Wall, a Resilience Wall, and a Justice & Equality Wall.
- As part of the celebration, youth clients were encouraged to write their own 'I Have a Dream' speeches, drawing inspiration from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s iconic speech. These speeches were then displayed, allowing everyone to share and learn from each other's dreams and aspirations. Each week, the youth and team at Highridge focused on a specific area through Psychoeducation Group sessions. Clients also watched movies that coincided with the theme or subject.
- The Memorial also depicted lives that were lost during efforts to achieve and maintain freedom for all, dating back to the "Freedom Riders" era and as recent as the Black Lives Matter movement.
- Throughout the month, their "Black History Highlights" featured motivational quotes, notable figures, and inventors/inventions of past and present-day entrepreneurs.
- 'Spirit' week was a special part of the Black History Month celebration. It was a week filled with activities designed to illustrate the lives of Black people from the days of slavery to the present. Each day had a different theme, and everyone was encouraged to dress up and participate in various activities, such as Cultural Potluck/Flag Day, to immerse themselves in American history and culture.

Also included in the celebration of Black History Month was: a "Dorm Door" decorating contest, highlighting heroes from past and present and their contribution to safety; inventors/notable figures tables emphasizing historical events and inventions/inventor; a "Commitments in Action Wall," which highlighted black men and women depicting their contributions to society, and a "Young Heroes Easel Display" showcasing teenagers who have positively impacted society.

PALM BEACH COUNTY BEHAVIORA **HEALTH COALITION YOUTH SUMM**

On Saturday, October 14, 2023, the Youth Services Department participated in the Palm Beach County Behavioral Health Youth Summit called 'Ride The WAVE (Wellness, Awareness, Visualization, Empathy).' Youth learned about leadership, drug prevention, and coping skills, and participated in art expression. Tammy K. Fields, Assistant County Administrator, and Lourdes Perez, Administrative Assistant I, shared about resources the Youth Services Department offers to youth and families.

Approximately 90 students from across the county representing over 40 schools participated in networking activities, breakout sessions and a service project. Each student who attended the summit at the Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County in Boynton Beach received a swag bag with trinkets, resources, a water bottle, and earned 6 hours of community service.

The Youth Services Department provided therapists for two breakout sessions at the event and Birth to 22's Future Leaders United for Change provided water bottles, a Zumba instructor, and Feverish Frozen Treats (Italian Ice).

Coping Skills 101

Therapists Marlene Aboytes, MSW, and Angela Heras, LCSW, led the youth in a group session focused on exploring coping skills and creating a Coping/Self Care Plan. The opening activity, Positive Self Talk, prompted each youth to write a positive affirmation on a piece of paper, which was later shared among the group. The youth were provided insight into the power of positive self-talk and encouraged to engage in this technique daily. Afterward, the clinicians led the group in an open discussion to explore the importance of coping skills, discuss the difference between healthy and unhealthy coping skills, and provide psychoeducation on two additional techniques (breathing and grounding techniques).

The latter portion of this group activity focused on the youth identifying their own personal coping skills and



creating a safe care plan. Each youth was provided with a coping card to document their coping skills and a healthy coping skills pamphlet of examples. The youth took turns sharing one of their coping skills with the group.

Empathy Circle

Therapists Marlene Aboytes, MSW, and Angela Heras, LCSW, led the youth in an empathy circle activity, which highlighted various topics such as bullying, drugs, and discrimination. Confidentiality and the exceptions were reviewed during the icebreaker activity. The youth all sat in a circle and were prompted to raise their hand if the sentence read applied to them. Questions asked included the following: Have you ever been bullied; Have you ever been discriminated against; Have you ever felt pressured to use drugs; Do you feel uncertain about the future?

Clinicians used reflections to facilitate conversations, and youth were encouraged to share personal experiences. A safe environment was provided for youth to ask additional questions. Toward the end of the group, the clinicians referenced various hands raised for each question to highlight the importance of bringing these topics into the conversation and to remind the youth that they are not alone. The clinicians discussed the therapy services available through Youth Services.

Katia Cavalie, Chief of Community Based Clinical Services, LCSW, and Brittany Grimshaw Houghtlin, MS Clinical Psychology Doctoral Intern, assisted Dr. Taylor. YFC therapist Marlene Aboytes, MSW, also assisted Palm Tran employees in their West County offices.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH OPENING CEREMONY

The 2023 Domestic Violence Awareness Month kicked off with an opening ceremony at the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO) Training Center on October 4, 2023. CBS News' Luli Ortiz was Mistress of Ceremonies of the "Palm Beach County Cares" themed event. Sixteen community leaders spoke of the coordinated efforts in the county, including Tammy K. Fields, Assistant County Administrator. Ms. Fields spoke of the effects domestic violence has on children and the services available for youth and families.

"We need to break the cycle of domestic violence and promote resilience in our children so they will enter adulthood healthy, strong and equipped to handle life's challenges," said Fields.

ERM TOUR OF LOXAHATCHEE SLOUGH



On December 1, 2023, Tevin Ali, Outreach and Public Information Coordinator, joined Deborah Drum, Director of the Environmental Resources Management (ERM) department, Michael A. Barnett, Palm Beach County Commissioner, District 3, and ERM staff for a tour of Loxahatchee Slough. Approximately 1/12 of the nearly 13,000 square acres preserve north of PGA near Beeline. This is Palm Beach County's largest natural preserve operated by ERM. ERM staff took the team on a swamp buggy through wetlands, dry areas, and locations that will be prepared for controlled burns to prevent wildfires. This area remains mostly untouched, as it existed nearly 5,000 years ago.



CROSS-DIVISIONAL ACTION TEAM (CDAT) KICKOFF MEETING FY 2024

The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department's Cross Divisional Action Teams (CDAT) delivered virtual presentations to the department on October 16, 2023, through Zoom.

2024 SUMMER CAMP SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM REGISTRATION PORTAL IS OPEN

Did you know that more than 3,000 Palm Beach County children received scholarships to attend camp last summer? Do you have a child or do you know a child who would benefit from summer camp? Now is the time to apply for summer camp scholarships that cover ALL costs at select camps throughout Palm Beach County!

On January 29, 2024, Palm Beach County Youth Services Department opened parent applications for summer camp scholarships. Parents can apply for Summer Camp Scholarships for their child through April 12, 2024.

The Summer Camp Scholarship Program offers eligible children, ages 5-17, a full scholarship to day camp for the entire summer. It allows parents to work with the knowledge that their children are safe and receiving educational and recreational growth opportunities. The Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners and Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County fund the scholarships.

The scholarship includes all tuition and fees for children residing in families with income at or below 185% of federal poverty guidelines. Parents may choose from participating camps in Palm Beach County.

The 2024 Summer Camp Scholarship Program is scheduled to begin on June 3.

Youth Services will offer extended hours to assist with parent applications on Tuesdays and Thursdays, by appointment only, until 7 p.m. throughout the application

period. Youth Services Department has held three of four outreach events.





PBC COMMUNITY SERVICES HOMELESS SUMN

On Thursday, November 9, 2023, the Leading the Way Home: Summit on Homelessness was held at the United Methodist Church in West Palm Beach. This summit discussed the cost of living in Palm Beach County, the progress made in the last 10 years, and the reasons for the re-examination of the "Leading" the Way Home" plan with a goal to end homelessness in our county. There was also an opportunity to divide into groups and discuss a variety of factors that affect homelessness, such as systems and services, housing, healthcare, and more.

Keynote Speaker Joey Nieves, Director of Outreach for The Lord's Place and Certified Recovery Specialist, discussed his experience as a homeless individual in Cleveland, Ohio, overcoming other challenges, and how he found his calling in his daily work.

Commissioners Gregg Weiss and Mack Bernard, and County Administrator Verdenia Baker provided remarks.

Dr. James Green, Director of Palm Beach County Community Services; Taruna Malhotra, Deputy Director of Palm Beach County Community Services; and Wendy Tippett, Director of Human Services and Community Action at Palm Beach County Community Services, provided important information on the state of homelessness in Palm Beach County.

Tammy Fields, Assistant County Administrator, and Elisa Cramer, Interim Director of Youth Services, participated with a focus on the needs of unsheltered children and families and older teens transitioning to adulthood.





POINT IN TIME COUNT

YSD participated in the Point in Time Count, stationed at Vita Nova. During the evening, Assistant County Administrator Tammy Fields and Youth Services Department Interim Director Elisa Cramer helped organize Vita Nova's clothing closet, which provides donated attire at no cost to teens and young adults served by Vita Nova. They also engaged in conversations with young adults who shared their personal experiences of housing insecurity and suggestions for capturing accurate counts of youth and young adults who are unsheltered.

The count occurred on Thursday, January 25, 2024, from 12 pm-12 am and Friday, January 26, 2024, from 4 am-12 pm.







READ FOR THE RECORD

On October 24, 2023, Tammy K. Fields, Assistant County Administrator, participated in the Annual 'Read for the Record' literary campaign. Ms. Fields read Jenny Torres Sanchez' wonderful story titled "With Lots of Love."


2023 Merit Rule Revisions (from 2007 Merit Rules)



What is your mission?

Our mission is to empower youth in diverse and underserved communities through dance fitness, technology, and the arts.

What does your organization do?

We are a local non-profit 501(c) (3) providing innovative programs and community/family night events to youth throughout Palm Beach County. Our mobile programs are focused on inspiring and empowering youth ages 5 – 18 through Dance Fitness, Technology and the Arts. Youth gain insight and learn how to use their creativity and talents to develop healthier habits, enhance team building skills, foster positive self-expression, and have fun through our engaging activities.

What key programs does your organization offer?

The key programs we provide are: Fitness Jamz provides youth with eight fun and engaging sessions where youth foster a love of fitness by incorporating physical activity and healthy behaviors into their everyday lives.

Wellness Workshop provides youth with a series of sessions focused on health, nutrition, wellness, dance, and overall fitness. Delivered by trained

instructors, Wellness Workshops engage youth in physical activity while promoting health and wellness.

Digital Expressions® provides youth with a series of mentoring sessions geared toward empowering them to be proactive in their journey to positive self-expression through audio production, art of dance, photo/video production, and literacy through lyrics.

How does your agency benefit the community?

We provide our communities with various family engagement events hosted in collaboration with Schools and Community Based Organizations looking for a safe and exciting way to gain parent engagement, quality family time and a method to build a bridge between resources and providers in our communities. Many our community of engagement activities focus on dance fitness, which inspires communities to prioritize their health and wellness and that of their families.

What is your agency's focus for 2024?

Our focus this year is to increase the awareness of overall wellness. If we can get our communities moving, active,

and taking charge of their lives in a healthier way, it will help improve mental, emotional, and physical well-being. Our goal is to start by increasing our efforts to really push our Let's Move Palm Beach County Commit to Change Challenge in partnership with the Palm Health Foundation. Last vear. 
